Absentee fathers" only seem to come in one color: Black. Though there are fathers of all races and ethnicities who have a minimal presence in their children's lives, "absentee" isn't used to describing most of them. This racialized term uniquely targets Black fathers, inaccurately signaling that they willfully abandon their children. In reality, data from the CDC show that Black fathers are equally as likely to be involved in their children's care as fathers of other races. There is, however, evidence that systemic racism has taken many Black fathers away from their families and communities through mass incarceration and early death. Its Summer! This Season of Pentecost is about Freedom! First, we acknowledge Pentecost, the day when we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit on the gathered disciples after the resurrection of Jesus marking the beginning of the Christian church. Next, we acknowledge <u>Juneteenth</u>, the day we remember the coming of federal troops with the word that the Civil War and Chattel Slavery were over almost two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation.

Pride, Pentecost, and Juneteenth may seem like strange bedfellows, but they have more in common than meets the eye.

Each is disruptive—upsetting the status quo and the expectations that people had come to have about the way the world worked. The Spirit caused an outpouring of praise in numerous languages and broke down the barriers that separated people-barriers of race, national origin, language, and faith.

SCHOLAR IN FOCUS | James Hal Cone (August 5, 1938 - April 28, 2018) was an American theologian, best known for his advocacy of black theology and black liberation theology. His 1969 book Black Theology and Black Power provided a new way to comprehensively define the distinctiveness of theology in the black church. Cone's work was influential from the time of the book's publication, and his work remains influential today. His work has been both used and critiqued inside and outside the African-American theological community. He was the Charles Augustus Briggs Distinguished Professor of Systematic Theology at Columbia University-affiliated Union Theological Seminary until his death.


BENEDICTION
