

### WHAT TO US IS THE FOURTH OF JULY?



BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED | 247 years ago, the men assembled in Pennsylvania State House, now known as Independence Hall, adopted the Declaration of Independence. In 1320 words, they determined that their desired future was impossible within their lived reality. Resolved to change their circumstances by any means necessary, they "mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor." On the front cover, the image of a Black boy attending the 1963 March on Washington is contrasted with the picture above of a Black girl attending a recent Protest on the latest pronouncement of the Supreme Court rolling back the very rights gained during the Civil Rights Movement. With Affirmative Action, Voting Protections, and Reproductive Health Care Choice all eviscerated by the radical right-winged Supreme Court, the question Frederick Douglass asked in 1852 as to "what this Fourth of July means" is a relevant as ever.





Established in 1914, Magnolia honors the Mother Church founded in 1864 near Louisville. Affectionately known as Sweet Magnolia, this ministry has stood as a physical representation of the hope and determination of the African American spirit. 
#### **BENEDICTION**

I say it with a sad sense of the disparity between us. I am not included within the pale of glorious anniversary! Your high independence only reveals the immeasurable distance between us. - Frederick Douglass

This weekend marks the 247th Fourth of July, declaring America's independence from Great Britain. Yes, the Fireworks, BBQ, and Waving Flags stir patriotic sentiments in our hearts.

At the same time, many of us yearn for the day when July Fourth does not invite the ambivalence we also feel this weekend. Both feelings are legitimate.

We long for the day when we can cherish the country we love without feeling torn by the two-ness that W.E.B. Du Bois wrote about in <u>The Souls of Black Folk</u>. And just as Douglass accurately prophesied the death of slavery in his famous speech, that day is coming. It's coming because of the determination of true patriots of all races who believe in the Founding Fathers' beautiful promises more than the Founding Fathers did. It will be our birthday present to America.

If it had been, Douglass would never have had to ask the electrifying question in his famous speech in 1852: "What, to the American slave, is your 4th of July?" If the founders had really meant what they said, there would not have been any slaves.

# Deeper Understanding

**AFFIRMATIVE ACTION** 

All but seven of the 115 Supreme Court justices in US history have been White men. Only three have been Black. Thurgood Marshall, Clarence Thomas, and Ketanji Brown Jackson. Racial discrimination is part and parcel of America's 236-year constitutional history. Affirmative Action was a remedy that alleviated the impact of that discrimination for the last 62 years. The decision upended decades of law and the higher education landscape. The ruling will shift the makeup of many of America's top universities — and the prospects of students who want to attend them.

In a 6-3 decision, the Court's six conservative justices declared that colleges' use of race as a factor in student admissions is unconstitutional. Citing the 14th Amendment prohibiting racial discriminationChief Justice John Roberts wrote for the majority that affirmative Action is racially discriminatory and unconstitutional. "Eliminating racial discrimination means eliminating all of it," he wrote. Okay, but what about housing segregation, pay gaps, health disparities, the prison industrial complex, and voting disenfranchisement, all tied to racial discrimination?

"With let-them-eat-cake obliviousness, today, the majority pulls the ripcord and announces 'colorblindness for all' by legal fiat," Justice Brown Jackson wrote in the dissent.
